

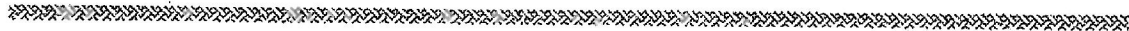

B. ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS FOR SENIOR COLLEGE PROGRAM

- A.A. degree in Economics and a minimum GPA of 2.50
- Grade of C or better in all Economics course(s)
- Grade of C or better in freshman English composition, its equivalent, or a higher-level English course
- Grade of C or better in a minimum 3-credit college-level, credit-bearing mathematics course

Total transfer credits granted toward the baccalaureate degree: 60

Total additional credits required at the senior college to complete baccalaureate degree: 60

Total credits required for the Economics Program: 120

C. TRANSFER CREDITS AWARDED

Borough of Manhattan Community College (BMCC) graduates who complete the Associate in Arts (A.A.) degree in Economics will receive 60 credits toward the Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) degree in Economics at Brooklyn College.

FOOTNOTES

- Students are strongly advised to take MAT 206. Additional credits taken are applied towards general electives.
- This requirement can be satisfied by taking a STEM variant. Additional credits taken are applied towards general electives.
- No more than two courses in any discipline or interdisciplinary field can be used to satisfy Flexible Core requirements.
- Students are strongly advised to take SPE 100 (or SPE 102) to satisfy this requirement.
- Students choosing to use curriculum requirements like ECO 201 and ECO 202 to satisfy the Flexible Core will be able to take their additional credits as general electives.
- If students take MAT 301 to satisfy their Quantitative Reasoning requirements they are advised to take MAT 302
- Choose three upper level economics courses. These include ECO 215 (Environmental Economics), ECO 221 (International Economics), ECO 223 (Economic History), ECO 225 (Public Economics), ECO 226 (Development Economics), ECO 230 (Feminist and Gender Economics), ECO 229 (Economics of Antitrust and Regulation), and ECO 250 (Money and Banking).
It is recommended that students planning to transfer to Brooklyn College take the following courses to satisfy the concentration of Urban Economics and Public Policy: BMCC - ECO 215 (Environmental Economics) same as BC - ECON 3252 (Environmental and Natural Resource Economics) AND BMCC - ECO 230 (Feminist and Gender Economics) same as BC - ECON 3154 (Women and the Contemporary Economy) OR ECO 235 (Labor Economics) same as BC - ECON 3212 (Labor Economics).
- It is recommended that students planning to transfer to Brooklyn College take the following courses to satisfy the concentration of Financial and International Economics: BMCC - ECO 221 (International Economics) same as BC - ECON 3352 (International Macroeconomics and Finance), AND BMCC - ECO 250 (Money and Banking) same as BC - ECON 3320 (Money and Banking).
- Choose courses in anthropology, geography, history, philosophy, political science, psychology, sociology, or any Ethnic Studies social science offering.

- The total number of credits needed to complete the major requirements at BC was adjusted by one credit from 35 to 34 as BMCC students will earn three credits for ECO 201 (Macroeconomics) at BMCC while the equivalent course at BC ECON 2100 (Elementary Macroeconomics) is four credits.

Students can choose to take any three Economics courses from the Financial and International Economics or Urban Economics and Public Policy concentrations as well as ECON 3102 (Intermediate Macroeconomics) or ECON 3202 (Intermediate Microeconomics). Since students from Borough of Manhattan Community College will arrive with one courses from either Financial and International Economics or Urban Economics and Public Policy concentrations, they will have to take two additional course to satisfy this concentration.</i></p>

2. Procedures for evaluating agreement (i.e., tracking the number of students who transfer under the articulation agreement and their success):



- Transfer advisors at BMCC will promote this agreement with eligible students.






